At the last meeting, held on November 7, 1991, Alex Cone (President) and Jon Roman came from Objective Technologies to speak and demonstrate their company's programming palettes for use with Interface Builder. These palettes allow formatted data entry, links to the power of the Mathematica kernel, and instant graphing capabilitiesall combined with the ease of use that Interface Builder offers to all NeXT programmers.

Mr. Cone also touched on some of the highlights of UNIX Expo, which he had just attended. He indicated the popularity of the NeXT booth in a market where nothing phenomenally neat has come out for quite some time, and mentioned that the speed of developing applications on the NeXT was a major factor in this interest. Being able to put together a working application at the Expo while people watched was certainly a good demonstration of this development speed!

Steve Jobs gave the keynote address at the Expo, and apparently talked about the future of UNIX being in a black cube about a foot on a side...
