

#### August Meeting.

NeXT and rmNUG and as I see it, we can provide each other with incredible resources. To kick off our new partnership, Businessland will be hosting our September meeting which will give us the opportunity to meet the Businessland staff and at the same time help them to better understand rmNUG.

Our special feature of the evening focused on FrameMaker by Frame Inc. Dave Bowdish and Professor Frank Hadsell each gave wonderful presentations on different aspects of FrameMaker. Dave started out with showing the rudiments of Frame usage and elementary navigation through the package. Dave used the rmNUG Newsletter as an example throughout his presentation as well as drawing upon his desktop publishing experience in general.

Frank is currently in the process of writing 3 books utilizing FrameMaker. He presented slides (several of which revealed the lighter side of Frank) detailing the problems and solutions that he has encountered during his writing. One of Frank's books is a mathematically complex textbook on the subject of Elastic Waves, his forte'. For this text Frank found it necessary to use Mathematica in combination with FrameMaker. Frank's textbook on Elastic Waves will truly be a standard by which other FrameMaker projects of commensurate magnitude will be judged.

There was an amazing amount of interest in the topic of Desktop publishing in general and FrameMaker in specific. I have been talking with the Corporate offices of Frame Inc. and they are very interested in coming out to Colorado and giving us their presentation. For those of you interested in yet another

#### NeXT News/Rumors

Rumors from InfoWorld's August 27 issue:

I'm not sure what purpose rumors serve, especially with the new NeXT announcement scheduled for September 18th, but here they are:

- "... the company plans to unveil three new computers all based on the 25-MHz 68040 microprocessor and one sporting a 24-bit color monitor on September 18 ..."
- "... The new color system, [...] includes 24-bit video and bundles Pixar's Renderman software..."
- "... None of the new systems include the optical drive used in the original machine, though it will be an option. ..."
- "... The two monochrome systems have pizza-box-size CPU boxes rather than cubes..."
- "... At least two units, including the color system, will include a 2.88-megabyte floppy drive that reads and writes DOS disks ..."
- "... The speed improvement of the 68040, estimated to be about three times that of the 68030, and 10 times in floating-point operations, ..."
- "... Lotus is now putting finishing touches on its Next financial modeling and spreadsheet program, which was written from the ground up for the Next platform, said a Lotus spokeswoman. Code-named Back Bay, the program has cross-tabbing and allows users to col-

lapse and expand data..."

"... Word Perfect plans to show its Next word processor when Next announces its new computer and to release it in October or November, according to Pete Peterson, vice president of Word Perfect."

# Recording with Cut, Copy, & Paste

This month's music article is for the non-technical people interested in music, as many of my articles will be. I'm answering the question about SoundPlayer (/NextDeveloper/Demos/SoundPlayer), "So NeXT included SoundPlayer to record from the monitor's microphone input, but where's the nifty cutcopy-paste like Mail's Lip Service?" Well, NeXT did include a sound recorder with cutcopy-paste you just have to look for it. In the directory /NextDeveloper/Examples/SoundEditor there's a set of source-code files for a program called SoundEditor. To use it, you'll have to compile it first. Here are the steps:

- 1 Copy the folder /NextDeveloper/Examples/SoundEditor into your home directory i.e. with two browsers open, drag the SoundEditor folder into your home directory)
- 2 Launch either Terminal or Shell (from NextApps)
- 3 When the cursor comes up in Terminal or Shell, type these commands: cd SoundEditor <return> make <return>
- 4 When the cursor returns (after a few minutes), in a browser find the SoundEditor folder in your home directory.

Copy the file SoundEditor from the Sound-Editor folder into the Apps folder in your home directory and select Find Applications from the Workspace Manager's Utilities menu. You can then delete the SoundEditor folder from your home directory.


You now have a sound recording program that supports cut-copy-paste commands. Launch SoundEditor and select New (Command-m) from the Window menu and you'll get a window that shows you a graphic representation of any sound you record. This sound window supports cut-copy-paste. For example, press Record in the Sound Editor window (the one with the level meter), speak (or whatever) into your microphone and hit stop when you're done recording. You can then select any portion of the sound and perform cut-copy-paste on it.

This article assumes you have an 1/8" plug microphone plugged into the back of your NeXT's monitor. If not, go get one Radio Shack sells them for around \$5.

You can execute the script (with /bin/sh) during off hours with the at(1) or cron(1) commands. Make sure you edit each line as is necessary. This example ftps the binary file NeXTBibleReview.wn located in the ~ftp/pub/next/buzzings directory of the cs.orst.edu site.

REMINDER: Anonymous FTP is a privilege, not a right. The site administrators for the sites listed below have made their systems available out of the good-ness of their hearts. Please respect their wishes and restrict your FTPing to non-prime hours (1900 - 0600 hours local time for the site). This is especially true for sites not in your country. Please keep that in mind when you are FTPing. None of us want to see sites start to close down because a few are being inconsiderate.
